Early Learning Subcommittee Meeting Aug 24, 2023, 7.30 pm, online via Zoom

Council's Early Learning Subcommittee is a forum for parents and carers whose children are attending (or about to attend) a playschool or preschool in the ACT. The subcommittee advocates for parents in early learning and public education, and promotes the benefits of quality early years learning. 1. Early Learning literacy foundations

Responding to recent media coverage around literacy teaching in ACT schools, the following summary of the issues: Council's recent guest speakers included the <u>ACT Alliance for Evidence-based education</u> (partners: Equity Economics and Snow Foundation), and the Education Directorate.

A recent report by Equity Economics highlights concerns and calls for the ACT to implement a year 1 phonics check and provide tutoring and one-on-one support for students who are falling behind (see summary/links, annex 1)

"Balanced literacy teaching" and "systematic synthetic phonics teaching" are two distinct approaches to teaching reading and literacy skills, each with its own philosophy and methods.

The Education Directorate response was comprehensive and included examples of how schools/teachers support preschool and kinder children's literacy development summarised:

Elements of Literacy Development

- Measurements: Include PISA (Program for International Student
 Assessment), NAPLAN (3,5,7,9), AEDC 2021 x 3 yrs (kinder), BASE (formerly PIPS),
 classroom assessment, parent engagement w learning.
- Curriculum and Instructional methods: and The <u>Australian curriculum</u>. and the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) 'Belonging, Being, and Becoming' (<u>LINK</u>) early years are transitioning between the framework and the curriculum. Both guide approaches to teaching literacy. ACT schools are also implementing the 10 essential instructional practices in literacy.
- **Professional Learning** and **Learning Communities:** Learning communities in schools have a significant role in professional collaboration which impacts literacy development and includes literacy teaching champions in ACT schools.
- Parent engagement: Support for parents to engage with their children's learning, and communication/collaboration for building parent-school partnerships.
- When students aren't making progress: Schools provide guidance on ways to support students. Council (via P&Cs) and the Education Directorate provide recommendations and links for working with your school – <u>ACT Education Directorate 'starting School'</u>.

The best thing parents and carers can do to boost children's reading and writing skills - read to your children, and ASK the teacher who can provide information about inclassroom activities and suggestions for learning.

Discussion/feedback from parents

Parent connections with school and teacher are mostly helpful. P&Cs rarely hear about issues raised by parents. Parents are often more invested when their child is struggling - every classroom has diverse student needs - schools try to make reasonable adjustments for all students to access their education, and teachers differentiate practice for all learners. If parents aren't getting the help they need, they are advised to provide feedback to the teacher, the school, or the education directorate: support students with learning difficulties through active monitoring and Response to Intervention, (an evidence-based tiered approach that responds to the needs of different students).

4. Recognising early childhood education in ACT law

In the ACT's EC strategy *Set up for Success,* one of the actions is to 'recognise early childhood education in ACT law'. To be achieved by amending the Education Act 2004 to recognise that early childhood education and care has a central role in the realisation of the rights of the child:

- 1. February 2019, the Child Safety in Schools Amendment Bill 2018.
- 2. August 2020, the Education Amendment Bill 2020
- 3. The Education Amendment Bill 2022 currently being considered by the ACT Legislative Assembly, and
- 4. aims to recognise the importance of early childhood education.

5. Council Submissions

Council provides submissions to official inquiries and government bodies representing the views of ACT public school parents. School P&Cs and Council subcommittees (such as this one) provide input to inform submissions. Most recently the 2023 Submission to the Senate Inquiry into the rising national trend of school refusal.

Equity Economics report findings.

The report said the ACT government should invest in a high-quality, low-variance curriculum, monitor progress through a year 1 phonics check, create systematic interventions for struggling readers, and provide training and coaching for principals and teachers to change the way children are taught to read to align with evidence-based methods.

The Science of reading identifies five specific reading sub-skills of phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension, which should be taught explicitly and systematically so all children become capable readers.

Version 9 of the Australian curriculum references to the cueing system and predictable texts removed.

Public schools follow the 10 Essential Instructional Practices in Literacy to provide a systematic, evidence-based approach to early literacy instruction. ACT literacy levels worse than 20 years ago. Calls for reform.

Learning to read proficiently is critical to a student's success in the rest of their education and is a predictor for their future education, health and employment outcomes.

ACT Education Minister Yvette Berry says teachers should use balanced approach for reading

How can parents find out about their child's reading and writing skills?

In response to a report from Equity Economics which recommended urgent intervention to align the teaching of reading with scientific evidence, Australian Education Union ACT branch president Angela Burroughs said the union supported teacher's ability to decide which teaching methods to use.
